


Welcome to our autumn 2016 newsletter, with information about the Highland Archaeology Festival, new courses and lectures and a roundup of project reports.

Autumn Courses and Lectures

Telford in Badenoch and Strathspey

Join us at Grantown Museum, 1-3:30pm to research the remains and impact of the early 19th century engineer Thomas Telford in the area. Sessions in the autumn will feature:

1st Dec: Courses on paper and the internet, including the Old and New Statistical Accounts

Tuesdays, 15th November for 4 weeks, 1-4:30pm at Highland Archive Centre in Inverness. Learn how to use the Highland Archives, and explore documents relating to the work of Thomas Telford and his times in the Highlands. Free – all welcome. For those who have never used the archives before, or for people who want to gain more experience and familiarity with them.

Wed 28th Sept: **The Scottish Archaeological Research Framework**

What is the current knowledge of Scottish Archaeology, and what research questions need to be investigated? Anna MacQuarrie, ScARF Museums Officer, presents a talk about past and future activities of the Scottish Archaeological Research Framework.

Wed 26th Oct: **Kirkmichael: Past, Present and Future**

Dr Jim Mackay will explore the medieval architecture and carved stones at Kirkmichael and Cullicudden in the Black Isle and compare with those found elsewhere. He will describe how the ancient buildings at Kirkmichael are being returned to life as a magnificent heritage resource, hosting a display of medieval carved stones.



Wed. 30th November: **The Rose Street Foundry's 120 Year Old Tile Mosaic Murals**

Eileen MacAskill will look at the Rose Street Foundry in Inverness, placing it in its context in Scotland, and in particular will focus on the wonderful tile mosaic murals made and brought all the way from Shropshire in 1896.

Highland Archaeology Festival

ARCH has been organising the Highland Archaeology Festival on behalf of Highland Council this year. For many of us HAF is the highlight of the heritage year. This year the festival runs from 1st-16th October, showcasing Highland Archaeology from earliest times to recent past. Look out for some new features including:

- **a dedicated website** at www.highlandarchaeologyfestival.org which has all events listed, and downloadable brochures and forms.
- **special keynote talks.** Richard Oram will open the festival on Friday, 30th September with a talk on 'Climate, Cattle and Caters: Environmental Change and the Transformation of the Medieval Highlands'. Rod McCullagh will launch the conference on Friday 14th October with a talk on 'Reflections on Excavations at Lairg.' Both are held at Highland Council HQ in Inverness, with suggested entry donation of £3.
- **an afternoon of workshops** at Council Headquarters on Friday 14th October. This is a chance to try your hand at a number of skills. See page three for further details.
- **a Highland Artefact Trail** to look at featured objects in 31 museums throughout the Highlands. There is a passport to record visits and the person with the most stamps wins a prize.
- **Poster sessions** for groups at the Conference.

Mon 10th Oct, 10am-12pm. **Strathpeffer Station Walk.** Explore part of the old branch line looking at some surviving remains, and then back to the Goods Shed for a warm drink and a look at archive material. Wellies recommended!



Tues 11th Oct 2-4pm. **Archives for Archaeological Research.** Join Susan Kruse at the Highland Archive Centre in Inverness to look at a selection of archive material useful for archaeological research.

ARCH will also be running two of the workshops on **14th October**: Roland Spencer-Jones on **Using GPS for Survey and Mapping** and Susan Kruse with an **Introduction to using the HER.**

The **Recent Archaeological Discoveries and Research conference** on 15th/16th October looks to be its usual diverse and interesting lineup. New this year is a round table panel discussion looking at Iron Age architecture. As usual ARCH will have a display with information and secondhand books. Susan Kruse will give a talk on the Sunday about the ARCH Invergordon wartime projects. Bookings this year can be done over the HAF website as well as by post.

Project Updates

Exploring Strathpeffer Station

As part of a project at the Highland Museum of Childhood, ARCH ran sessions investigating the history of the station, with participants helping with creating interpretative panels (see ARCH newsletter 34, June 2016). The panels are currently being printed, and should be installed in the next months. The group also helped with the [blog](#) which summarises some of the research and should become more active in the autumn when building works start.

Invergordon in World War II

ARCH has been providing sessions for Invergordon Museum where people have been gathering to remember the town in World War II, and to investigate the changes by using aerial photographs and other resources. The lively, well-attended sessions have unearthed a wealth of information and detail. The group is currently pulling it together into a display which will be launched on 8th October. Scotland's Urban Past Training Day

On 30th July, the Scotlands Urban Past team came to Dingwall to run a session on how to record standing buildings. The enigmatic doocot on Castle Street was the focus of attention, as participants learned how to examine, sketch, plane table and photograph the structure. Inevitably more questions were raised than answered about the structure, but all found it a useful and stimulating day.

Volunteers are required for general archaeological work in and around the old kirk




buildings at Kirkmichael, near Balblair on the Black Isle. They will be processing floor debris to find any fragments of broken monument among other interesting activity required by the repair works. No previous experience is needed, but you should have a reasonable level of fitness and be able to commit to at least two days at a time. Provisional dates are 17th October onwards for three weeks, with the possibility of some Saturday working. ARCH in the news

The Heritage Lottery Fund's Programmes Evaluation and Outcomes Review (2010-2013) singled out ARCH for praise in its project evaluation of our Stop, Look at Listen project (run 2010-2012). We are cited as the Best Community Archaeology evaluation report they received, with the Social Audit undertaken by project seen as an example of a 'robust or innovative approach to making evaluation matter'. ARCH is also cited as an example of good practice in setting out a 'theory of change' in diagrammatic format (credit for this goes to Caroline Vawdrey, the outreach officer of the project).

Altogether this is high praise, since of the 92 reports considered by the review, only 16% were seen as very good, 22% as good, 40% as fair and 22% as poor, and the sample included projects from throughout the UK.
