Talks

NoSAS has been running short talks and discussion evenings for its members fortnightly on topics as diverse as military roads, the kelp industry in Loch Broom, Raigmore hospital, archaeology along the West Link road development in Inverness, charcoal burning, wooden objects in the NMS, exploring Coigach from maps and on the ground, and Wemyss caves.
