#### **Get Digging!**

Ever wondered what happens on an archaeological excavation? This summer is your chance to find out! ARCH will investigate a possible medieval castle and old routeway at Foulis near Evanton in July. If you've ever wondered about digging, this is a chance to learn what it's all about.



What makes the ARCH excavation different from many others? First of all, it will include indoor classes before and after the excavation. Secondly the site can be reached by public transport. And thirdly ARCH provides childcare so parents can attend!

The pre-excavation class, beginning 7th June in Alness for 4 weeks, will look at the sites and sources in detail including historical maps, aerial photographs and documentary sources.

The excavation will take place 9th-24th July. Participants will learn a variety of excavation, survey and recording techniques while digging on site. All levels of experience welcome, from firsttime diggers to seasoned excavators.

The main focus is a possible motte site near Foulis Castle, Evanton. By opening a few trenches on this site we aim to find out more about the character and date of this enigmatic mound. Trenches will also be opened over the

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possible location of an ancient routeway running through the site. We aim to determine exactly where this route runs and how it relates to the possible motte feature.

The field season in July will be followed in September 2011 by a post excavation course looking at how archaeologists deal with all the data and finds produced by excavations. Sessions will include looking at the site records from our excavation, implementing postexcavation techniques, analysing and presenting any finds and presenting our initial interpretations through a display. Dates and times will be in the next newsletter.

For those coming by public transport to the dig, there will be a meeting place in Dingwall, followed by taxis to and from the site. There is also parking is available near the site.

Free childcare is provided in Dingwall – please ring ARCH offices for further information and to book spaces for your children on the days you want to dig.

**Booking essential**: We ask that people book ideally for a minimum of 3 days, and that you know which dates you can dig before phoning to book.

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# **ARCH Touring Displays**

ARCH exhibitions continute to travel!

- Pathways into the Past: Dingwall to Evanton

### **Culbin Sands Display**

A dedicated group in the **Display the Past** course at Nairn Museum researched, designed and constructed a display based around the archaeological finds found at nearby Culbin Sands. The display covers aspects of the finds and activity at Culbin from early prehistory to present day.

The display includes finds, photographs and information about Culbin as well as an accessible children's section and the opportunity to handle and investigate finds for yourself. **Catch it before the end of June**. Many thanks go to Elgin Museum who have loaned some finds for the duration of the display.





# Community Timelines at Auldearn and Tomatin

Groups in Tomatin and Auldearn researched their heritage, producing a large binder of information and travelling displays. A number of new sites were recorded, from windmills to settlements, and old and new photographs obtained of known sites and finds. As a result of all the hard work, a large amount of information

and pictures will shortly be submitted to the HER. Participants in both areas hope to continue exploring local heritage.



#### Heritage Along the Kyle Line

An ARCH class explored the middle section of the Kyle line route, investigating the heritage between Strathcarron and Lochluichart. A surprising amount was recorded, including remains of transport, hydro activity, and even prehistoric burials. The results can be seen on a temporary display currently at Achnasheen, and later to be kept at the Friends of the Kyle line museum on Kyle station.

The focus now switches to the last section of the line, Lochluichart to Dingwall. Details of the course can be found on p. 4.





#### Picture the Past Dornoch to Tain

During a long weekend in February, we explored, photographed and recorded a number of buildings and sites in Dornoch, Tain and Camore thanks to funding from Moray Firth Partnership, Highland Council and the BBC (which featured the work as part of their Hands on History programme tied in with the Ancient Britain series). Despite challenging weather in Tain, a good time was had by all. The results will form a valuable addition to the Highland Council HER.

#### Surveying and Recording Sites

Now that the weather has finally improved, it's possible to get outside to explore and record sites! ARCH will run two courses this spring:

- Survey a crofting site in Boblainy Forest, 28th April—1st May. This is part of the Boblainy Forest Archaeology Project run by Kiltarlity Community Council. Contact the ARCH office if you are interested in coming along for some or all of these sessions.
- Surveying a routeway at Foulis near Evanton in May, with indoor sessions in Alness before and after an outdoor weekend on 14th/15th May. Details on p. 4

#### Living in the Past

Brian Wilkinson, Education Officer from the Scotland's Rural Past project, came up for a weekend in March to work with ARCH helping children to explore and record a crofting site near Tore. Tore Primary school had spent the months before preparing for the day. On the Friday the school explored the site in the morning and followed this up indoors in the afternoon. The following Saturday it was the turn of the local Young Archaeologists Clubs. During the morning the 8 to 15 year olds made a detailed record with sketches and photographs (including a high-spy shot). Then in the afternoon they were helped by local artist Lizzie MacDougall to create an interpretation of the site. These will be completed in April, and then featured at the Scotland's Rural Past final conference in June as a powerpoint and picture display.
