# Highland Archaeology Festival

The Highland Archaeology Festival is full of walks, talks, workshops and other activities from 29<sup>th</sup> September to 14<sup>th</sup> October - and a few before and after. The programme is available on the Highland Council website and paper copies are available from libraries, museums etc.

### ARCH at the Festival

ARCH is running a wide variety of activities, and will have displays and books for sale at the Recent Archaeological Discoveries and Research seminar at Eden Court 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> October.

Sunday 30 September 2.00 - 3.30pm: A tour of the recently-excavated mound and other archaeological sites in the vicinity of Foulis, near Evanton. Find out what our excavation revealed about this site and its use in the past. Meet at Foulis Burn bridge layby on the Old Evanton Road (NH 593 637). Children welcome if accompanied by parent/guardian. Wear stout shoes & bring waterproofs.

Monday 1 October 10.30 - 12.00: A guided tour of the medieval remains of Beauly Priory by Susan Kruse and John Finlay. Part of a Priory Trail accessible by public transport. Wear stout shoes and wet

#### Focus on Finds

26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> September, 10-3:30, Timespan Museum, Helmsdale This two-day workshop will provide a chronological overview of heritage in the Highlands from

earliest settlers to recent times, with the emphasis on typical finds through to the Medieval period, followed by a practical session on using the HER and other major sources of information on the web. For the second day, participants will be asked to bring an object or picture of a find from their collection dating up to the Medieval period if possible. We will research the object, create a short description which could be used for a label, photograph the object, and then submit an entry to the HER. No previous experience necessary. Although aimed at museum staff and volunteers, others interested in finds are also welcome.

Free, with tea, coffee and biscuits will be provided, though participants should bring their own packed lunch.

#### Highland Finds in Context

12<sup>th</sup> October, 10-4pm, Inverness Museum and Art Gallery

A day workshop exploring Highland finds in their context. Aimed at museum staff, volunteers and anyone interested in Highland finds, this day will include an overview of Highland finds by Susan Kruse of ARCH, Cait McCullagh and Jeanette Pearson of Inverness Museum speaking about dealing with finds from initial registration to care, Trevor Cowie (National Museums of Scotland) on Bronze Age metalwork and pottery, and Stuart Campbell of Treasure Trove Scotland on Medieval and later finds. Lunch is not provided, but the museum has a cafe. This event is also supported by High Life Highland.

## Recording the Caledonian Canal
