

Summer Events

Although most lecture series, including ARCH's, wind down over the summer, the Groam House Museum series fills the gap. Elgin Museum has also arranged a full and exciting programme for the year with activities for adults and children. Inverness Museum and Art Gallery has a number of children and adult activities themed around their Valhalla exhibition, and a conference on the 25th of August. Fort George is holding a special event - Amazing Ages on 12th & 13th August where there will be music, crafts, encampments, re-enactments and archaeologists. HAF 2017

ARCH is organising the Highland Archaeology Festival again on



behalf of Highland Council. Already it's shaping up to be a full and varied programme, thanks to the many organisations, museums and individuals who are offering events. The festival will showcase events from earliest settlers to recent times, focussing on Highland archaeology, history and heritage.

Conference

The conference held at the end of HAF, this year on 14th & 15th October, in Inverness has another exciting lineup covering recent research and investigation of Highland heritage by community organisations, archaeologists and individuals. We are trying to encourage as many local groups as possible to have a table at the conference where they can promote their organisation and any projects they have been involved in. And this year you can purchase pre-booked sandwiches at the conference. Details are already on the website, and will be in the printed brochure.

Trails

The festival will feature three trails this year: self-guided trails you can explore at any time during the year, a HAF geocache trail which

will also then continue throughout the year and a museum trail where you can explore featured objects in participating museums, collecting stamps on the HAF passport. Again, details on the website or in the brochure.



Workshops

We're offering another workshop afternoon, on Friday 13th October, with hands-on workshops including photography (from basics to specialised techniques), using aerial photos, internet maps, gps mapping, using the HER, and unravelling building features. It's a chance to learn something new or hone your skills.

ARCH will be offering as usual a range of walks and talks – and again by popular demand, an archaeological pub quiz (on Sunday 1st October in Beauly). More details will be highlighted in the September newsletter.





Kiltearn Old Kirk

ARCH continues to provide a number of activities for the Evanton Community Trust's Kiltearn Old Kirk project. In our April 2017 newsletter we noted the historical research which has proved so fruitful. Volunteers have been looking at various historical works, Kirk Session Records and archives from Foulis Castle held at Highland Archives and also at the Castle.

Meanwhile work is underway recording gravestones in the cemetery. A surprising number of early gravestones have been found dating to the 17th and 18th centuries, many very worn so it is critical to record them now. Some lovely examples with symbols of mortality survive (see page 4 of the newsletter).



In April we had a well-attended walk, looking at the church and at the enigmatic fishing station on the firth. We were fortunate that architect Andrew Wright was able to come and share his expertise – and his puzzlement over the bothy!

In May Anne Fraser of the Highland Archive Centre ran excellent sessions on how to do family history research, and volunteers are now compiling lists of names from the historical research and the gravestone recording to investigate.

In June Lynne McKeggie of Highland Archaeology Services, and longtime instructor with ARCH, taught volunteers how to do a simple standing building survey, creating an accurate plan of the church and elevation drawing of the east end which shows a blocked medieval window. We also did a detailed photographic survey of the interior and exterior, an exercise which made us look in detail at the church.

What comes next? We continue to record gravestones, and if you are interested in getting

involved, do get in touch. In July we will start pulling this information together for a display to launch during Highland Archaeology Festival, and for a signboard. These sessions will be held at Cornerstone Café in Evanton on Monday evenings, **17th July – 28th August, 7-9:30pm**. All welcome, even if you haven't been able to attend previous sessions or can't attend all the sessions. Free!

Future projects

Highland Querns

After much hard work and consultation, we were very disappointed to be unsuccessful in our application to the Heritage Lottery Fund for a project investigating Highland querns. We will be considering alternative funding possibilities, but this is likely to mean a further delay until 2018. In the meantime, if you come across any hand querns in your travels, let us know!

Experimental Archaeology

A project to provide experimental archaeology workshops, and then create loan boxes and learning materials was mentioned in our January 2017 newsletter. We have received partial funding for the project, and have submitted an application for its match. If successful, we will be reporting on this in September.

Regional ScARF

ARCH is very excited to be involved in a project to create a summary of archaeology in the Highlands, identifying gaps in knowledge and regional trends. This will complement the national ScARF (mentioned in our January 2014 newsletter) which is a very useful resource hosted by the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland and available on <u>www.scottishheritagehub.com</u>. We would hope to involve academics, students, units, local groups, U3A groups, the council, museums and anyone else interested in Highland Archaeology. There is plenty of scope for dissertation topics here!

Wartime projects

ARCH's work on WWI and WWII wartime remains in Invergordon, Evanton, Spinningdale, and various individual sites continues to attract interest. Several groups have been in touch with us asking about helping with projects in their areas. The WWII projects in particular are a matter of urgency: we are nearing our last chances to speak with people who remember!
