Highland Regional ScARF

ARCH is pleased to announce we've received funding from Historic Environment Scotland and support from Highland Council for an exciting new three year project to create a Highland Regional ScARF. The national Scottish Archaeological Research Framework (ScARF) was published in 2012 by the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland on www.scottishheritagehub.com. Panels of experts provided a summary of what was known about each period of Scottish archaeology from earliest settlers to modern times, and identified gaps for future research to tackle.

The Scottish Archaeology Strategy in 2015 recognised that there were regional differences, and recommended that regional ScARFs be developed. ARCH will be leading the one for Highland (defined as the Highland Council area), and hopes to involve academics, students, museums, community groups, educational groups, commercial units and individual researchers.

If you have information or questions to contribute, we want to hear from you! Perhaps your local group is thinking about investigating local sites, or your museum wants to highlight some key artefacts. There are opportunities for dissertation topics, or individual research projects. Or perhaps you want to draw our attention to previous projects you feel should be better known.

At the end of three years we will have an up-to-date summary of Highland archaeology, available on the internet, with topics identified for future research and investigation.

Conference

To kickstart the project, there will be a Symposium on **Highland Archaeology: Past, Present and Future** to be held on 2nd and 3rd of June at Highland Council headquarters in Inverness. The event is for everyone who is interested, with

Speakers include Caroline Wickham-Jones (Mesolithic and earlier Highland), Alison Sheridan (Neolithic Highland), Trevor Cowie (Bronze Age), Andy Heald (Iron Age), Gordon Noble (Picts), Cecily Spall (Medieval), Malcolm Bangor-Jones (post-Medieval vernacular architecture and settlement), Allan Kilpatrick (wartime remains), and Scott Timpany (environmental evidence for the Highlands). Thanks to funding from HES the event is free; lunches may be booked for £5.25 for each day. 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Experimental Archaeology

The monthly Experimental Archaeology workshops are going from strength to strength, gathering more participants with each one. There have also been special youth sessions with Marybank Scouts (flint knapping) and Dingwall Primary P4 (Viking bone working). 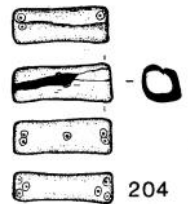


ARCH Lecture Series

The ARCH lecture series remains the last Wednesday of the month but has moved venue. All talks are in **Dingwall Lower Town Hall**. Entrance is via the side of the Town Hall (on Church Street), with closest parking at the Cromartie Car Park or off Mart road. Talks start at 7:30pm; suggested donation £3.

25 April '**Bringing a legacy project to publication - the Neolithic and Bronze Age Udal, North Uist**'
Beverley Ballin Smith from Glasgow has been part of a team of specialists working to analyse and publish important excavations undertaken by Iain Crawford in North Uist in the 1960s. This talk will focus on the late Neolithic and Bronze Age occupation at this site.

30 May: '**Playtime in Pictland**'
Join Mark Hall (Perth Museum) as he leads us on a playful journey of roads less travelled by to unravel the story of board games in early medieval Scotland.



27 June '**The Achavanich Beaker Burial project: latest developments and discoveries**'

Over the last three years Maya Hoole has been researching the early Bronze Age burial of a young female from Caithness. With all of the results now in, she will pull together the findings including: osteology, histology, ancient DNA, stable isotope analysis, facial reconstruction, pollen analysis, radiocarbon dating, archaeozoology, and pottery analysis.



We will also be rescheduling Iain Robertson's talk on 'Land Legacies: the enduring impact of the First World War on the Highlands and islands' which unfortunately was cancelled due to the weather in February.

Rosemarkie, Fortrose and Avoch in World War I

Over the last few months this Groam House Museum project with sessions led by Susan Kruse of ARCH has been researching this area of the Black Isle during WWI and information about those who served abroad. We've met with Inverness Local History Forum, searched for gun and searchlight emplacements, trawled through newspapers, burgh minutes and other archives and undertaken family history searches. We've had some notable results, discovering that the little-known Highland Cyclist Battalion was at Fortrose the whole war and that there was a short-lived boom across the firth between Fort George and Rosemarkie in 1918, to control shipping and protect the U.S. Navy mine assembling base in Inverness.



The group has written and designed an exhibition which opens 18 May at Groam House Museum and will be there for the summer. After that it will travel to various other local venues.



Highland Archaeology Festival 2018

This is the 25th year of HAF! The festival will take place 29th September to 19th October, with the Recent Archaeological Discoveries and Research conference in

Inverness on the 13th & 14th October. As for the last two years, ARCH will be organising the festival on behalf of Highland Council.

As ever, the success of the festival depends on groups, museums and individuals contributing events and exhibitions. Some are special, but it may just be the case of advertising an already programmed event like a lecture. The deadline for offering events is **1st June**.
