

Welcome to our first newsletter for 2019. There are lots of dates for your diary with opportunities to get involved throughout the Highlands.

Highland Regional ScARF

The Highland Regional ScARF project continues with a lot of work behind the scenes. This 3 year project, funded by Historic Environment Scotland with support from Highland Council, kicked off with a symposium in June. It will create an overview of Highland heritage from earliest times to 21st century, looking at what is the same as the national picture, what is different and what are the research questions which need investigating (see ARCH website for more details).

This first year is devoted to sourcing information and getting our data as up-to-date and accurate as possible. Grace Woolmer has been working away at the Council, helping update HER records, process downloads from Canmore, and adding new sites. Susan Kruse has written to all museums asking them for details about key objects, and setting up visits and workshops (see below).

Can you help?

HighARF is hoping to involve a wide range of people. Is there a topic, site or find which holds special interest to your or a group you are part of? Case studies, research and photographs all welcome. Contribution forms and examples are on the ARCH website in the Library, or email Susan or Grace if you want to discuss.

The HER and Canmore provide a very good record of sites and buildings (though there are still many to be recorded). However, the online databases have limited information about finds. Yet often the finds are



the only evidence of earlier activity.

HISTORIC ENVIRONMENT SCOTLAND

ÀRAINNEACHD EACHDRAIDHEIL ALBA ARCH is always looking for projects which cover a wide area of the Highlands. As part of the ScARF project, we are currently trying to assess what key objects are in Highland and other museums, and have sent a detailed questionnaire to all museums in the Highlands. Many museums do not have the staff to respond to such queries, and would welcome help. If you have some time to spare and would welcome looking at museum objects and collections, please let us know, and we can see if there are opportunities locally. This is a great opportunity to help behind the scenes at local museums.

The following dates are set:

Inverness Museum and Art Gallery are getting their large collection onto an on-line catalogue. Work includes looking at objects in store, but also assessing some of the excavation assemblages. This is a big task, so the museum has broken this down into 3-week blocks meeting on Mondays: 14, 21 and 28 Jan; 11, 18 and 25 Feb; 25 Mar, 1 and 8 Apr; 13, 20 and 27 May; 17 and 24

June, 1 July. Volunteers are asked to commit to a block, either half or full day, though you can sign up for as many blocks as you would like. Please book to Susan Kruse at ARCH in the first instance, and we will get back to you.





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West Highland Museum, Fort William

The museum has a large and varied collection, and volunteers will be needed to look at the catalogue to help answer the questionnaire. Our first meeting is **Wednesday 13**th **February 10-1**. Contact Susan if you are interested.



Dunrobin Castle Museum

Tues 29 Jan. 'Maps, Map-makers and Map-making – the stories from the Lovat Estate Map Archive'

Roland Spencer-Jones will describe the NoSAS project which digitised the maps of the Lovat Estates, showing a number of examples. He will explore the world of pre-OS map-making, focussing on the stories that the Lovat Estate maps tell us.

Tues 26th Feb. **Developing Digital Models of the** Past

Jacquie Aitken of Timespan Museum will talk about the processes and methods for developing digital research models of the past, depicting sites and landscape reconstructs, as well as 3D object use.

Tues 26th Mar. 10,000 Plus Years of Highland Heritage

Susan Kruse will provide an overview of what we know about Highland heritage (in an hour!) – and the opportunities the Highland Regional ScARF project provides to contribute to this picture.

Tues 30th Apr. **Scotland, Industrialisation and Empire: Two island fishing stations in Loch Broom**

Cathy Dagg tells the story of 30 years of change, 1770-1800, which left a lasting impact socially, materially and environmentally on a remote, isolated and backward part of the Highlands and how Loch Broom played its own small but significant role in the development of the British Empire.

Tues 28th May. Corrugated Iron Vernacular Buildings of the Highlands

The processes of corrugating and galvanising wrought iron sheets into strong, durable, lightweight and readily transportable building materials were developed in 1829 -37. Nowadays, the visible legacy is fast-disappearing or dilapidating but, as illustrated in this talk by Graham Clark, a surprising variety of fine corrugated iron buildings are still standing throughout the Highlands.

Tues 25th June. The Coastal Heritage of the Highland Region: reflections from SCAPE.

SCAPE has been working with the public documenting and investigating the coastal archaeological heritage of Scotland for 20 years. During that time we have learnt an enormous amount about the archaeology; about how coasts change and the drivers of change; and about working with people in projects that make the most of our eroding heritage. Joanna Hambley will reflect upon what we have learned about coastal heritage and coastal change in the Highland region, and consider what lies ahead.

New Project: Wartime Dalmore

ARCH leads a project to investigate wartime Dalmore near Alness. During WWI the distillery was requisitioned by the U.S. Navy as one of three Scottish centres to assemble and deploy mines from Orkney to Norway. It is the best preserved of the three, with one surviving building and foundations of others. In WWII the distillery was again taken over, this time by the RAF which had outgrown facilities in Invergordon.

Join us to research this interesting history, using maps, plans, first hand accounts, a photograph album recently donated to Invergordon Museum, and other sources. We are particularly interested in any memories people have of the site. We will meet on Thursdays, beginning **7th and 14th February** at Invergordon Museum, 7-9pm. A grant of £300 towards the cost of the project was generously donated by Orion Group, and other funding is being sought.

Project Reports Experimental Archaeology

The Experimental Archaeology workshops finished in October 2018 with a crafting day featuring four crafts: green woodworking, flint knapping, basket making and producing lead seals. Workshop leaders were very generous with objects, and instead of one loans box, it now looks like we will have three! Teacher Dave Peers and archaeologists Lachlan and Lynne McKeggie are currently working together to produce learning materials which will accompany the boxes. The project is funded by Historic Environment Scotland and the Heritage Lottery Fund.



Highland Archaeology Festival

ARCH ran 7 well-attended events, as well as providing displays and two poster sessions at the annual conference. The tour of Dalmore had over 70 people alone! Our tour of the Tomatin ROC post was the last before it is demolished by the dualling of the A9. With the landlord's permission, the contents have been donated to the Cabrach Trust who will use them in their ROC post whose contents had been previously stripped.

On behalf of Highland Council ARCH again organised the festival and conference which saw record numbers. Work has already started for next year – more in the next newsletter.
