

Welcome to the autumn edition of the ARCH newsletter. There are lots of ARCH activities on offer, including many which are part of Scottish Archaeology Month and Highland Archaeology Fortnight.

Feats of Clay: An investigation into the Bronze Age in the Moray Firth

ARCH is participating in an exciting project run by North Kessock & District Local History Society focussing on Bronze Age metalworking in the Moray Firth. During recent excavations in advance of house construction at

Bellfield Farm, North Kessock a number of Iron Age round houses and pits were discovered. Some of the pits contained Bronze Age pottery and metalworking debris, including fragments of baked clay moulds. Trevor Cowie at the National Museums of Scotland analysed the moulds and discovered that they were used to create sickles of a late Bronze Age type.

This is quite exciting! The site is only one of a handful known in Scotland where late Bronze Age metalworking took place. The type of sickle itself is rare, with only five known from Scotland, including an example from Dores (right)

The 'Feats of Clay' project will allow people to investigate and promote the context of these finds. Analysis of the moulds is being undertaken by a specialist, while at the same time local people are sharing memories of clay sources in the area and investigating old maps. On 10th and 14th September we will collect samples from possible sources. Anyone who would like to participate should contact the ARCH office.

The clay investigations will be followed by a short course on the Bronze Age in the Moray Firth run by Susan Kruse of ARCH, for three weeks beginning 18th September, meeting at the North Kessock **Mission Hall** at 7:30pm. On the 3rd October, Trevor Cowie of the National Museums of Scotland will give a talk on 'Magic Metals: glimpses of the late Bronze Age in Easter Ross' for the



North Kessock & District Local History Society at Knockbain Free Church Hall, 7:45 pm (non-members welcome).

These activities are all leading up to a **Bronze Age crafting day** on Saturday 5th October at North Kessock **Village Hall**, 10-4:30. Neil Burridge from Cornwall will produce replica sickles and other metalwork, and a range of other Bronze Age crafts will be on offer, including basket making, spoon and bowlmaking, pottery, bread making and textiles. It should be an exciting day for all ages!



Later in the autumn and winter there will also be opportunities for people to help research and photograph

Bronze Age metalwork from the Moray Firth area, which will be showcased in a book to be written by Trevor Cowie. And finally in 2014 the North Kessock & District Local History Society will pull all of these strands together in its annual exhibition. Altogether it adds up to an exciting programme focussing on the Bronze Age in the Moray Firth area!

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
Evanton Wartime Remains

The Evanton Wartime Remains project is nearing its end. Over the summer the final recording took place, and the tally is over 160 sites, most of them newly recorded. These will soon be submitted to the HER, the RCAHMS and SCAPE. A listing of these sites is also available now from the ARCH website.

The project finishes at the end of September with a flurry of activities. On Saturday, 28th September, Cornerstone Cafe in Evanton, 10-2, there will be another chance to see the displays created by the group. The book and leaflet produced over the summer will be launched at 1:30.

On Sunday, 29th September, 11-4, a guided walk will look at some of the buildings remaining and sites of the wartime airfield. Finally, on Monday, 30th September, the first ARCH lecture of the year will be given by Susan Kruse, and will describe the impressive results from this project. See p. 3 for details.

An Introduction to Open Source GIS

The Evanton Wartime Remains was able to make use of a wide range of maps and plans: wartime plans (including keys detailing building functions), aerial photos from the 1940s through 1960s, OS maps from the 1960s onwards and google earth. Using free software, Malcolm Standring geo-referenced this material, basically creating layers of information. This proved invaluable when trying to locate structures, especially after modern rebuilding.

Malcolm will offer a taster workshop on using Open Source QGIS, providing people with an introduction to the benefits of using GIS. Cost £3 per person , free to low income. Wednesday, 11th September, 7:30-9:30 Cornerstone Cafe, Evanton.
