Two years ago, ARCH held a free family festival in Dingwall, inviting museums, local societies and national and regional heritage groups to show their work. Alongside this were workshops, talks and a heritage marketplace.

Many people asked for this to become a regular event and we are pleased to announce the next festival! We've taken on board your suggestions for more workshops and demonstrations which are repeated, more children's activities, and more publicity.

* Do you have what it takes to be a Viking?

Join with Thorstein the Red and his wife Thurid on a Viking adventure: long-ship race, weapon training, name calling, rune writing, spinning, stories & more – maybe even a raid! Ages 7 to 11. Costumes provided (and weapons for the brave!). Booking essential.

Remembering the Kyle of Sutherland

12th June, Kincardine Old Church, 7-9pm Dr Malcolm Bangor-Jones will provide an overview of Telford's activities in this area.

Researching Local History I: Heritage databases

19th June, Bonar Bridge Community Hall, 7-9:30 This workshop will introduce the Highland HER and Canmore databases of all known heritage. No previous experience needed.

Reseaching Local History II: Old Maps

26th June, Bonar Bridge Community Hall, 7-9:30 This workshop will explore old maps, both before and after Telford's activities in the area, using primarily maps available on the Internet.

Coming Soon: Knockbain Heritage

The area of Knockbain on the Black Isle is often overlooked, but has a rich prehistoric and later heritage.



Knockbain Community Council, with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund and Highland Council, has asked ARCH to provide sessions on sharing memories, an overview of the heritage, and opportunities to research areas of interest. Timings are still being finalised but if you are interested in being kept informed of activities contact the ARCH office.

Ardersier Heritage Walk

Last year a group met at Ardersier to explore local heritage. There was keen interest in the



group to update a walks leaflet. In a short course organised by the Workers' Educational Association, and again funded by High Life Highland, Susan Kruse returned to the group and helped them complete the leaflet. In an easy walk, it tells the story of this interesting village. The leaflet is available from the library and shops in Ardersier. The group now has bigger plans!



Winter Reports

Ancient Crafts: Tain

Lynne McKeggie, course tutor, reports on this High Life Highland funded course.

'I definitely want to come back to Tain! Four weeks of enthusiastic participants, all eager to throw themselves into trying out some new (old) crafts. First we tackled Fingerloop braiding, which is a bit of a finger muddle. Next it was Weaving, and some truly inspirational items were made on the day. Even more lovely woven bags were made over the coming weeks and brought in to show to the admiring group! Then tablet weaving. Despite feeling as though this was clearly the most sophisticated craft activity humanity has ever developed, the exclamations of astonishment when participants found that they actually had made a beautifully patterned woven

strap was most gratifying. And lastly came Naal Binding - or Viking knitting as I billed it. Our room was soon infested with rather adorable woolen mice.



These may now be coming to a fundraising event near you to raise money for a local cause.

And as if this wasn't enough, add stimulating discussions about Iron Age structures, Pictish stones, Vikings (and chocolate cake!) - what a great way to spend four Saturdays. A big thank you to all the participants at the Tain Ancient Craft workshops for making it so much fun!'

BA Metalwork from the Moray Firth Area

The North Kessock Feats of Clay project has been mentioned in several previous newsletters. One of the outputs from the project will be a book written by Trevor Cowie pulling together Bronze Age metalworking from the Moray Firth Area. A class funded by High Life Highland is contributing to the book. Participants



compiled a list of all known Bronze Age objects from Auldearn to Glenurquhart and Aviemore to the Dornoch Firth. The group has also been photographing objects for the book, from museums in Inverness, Elgin and Edinburgh. In the end over 150 objects were recorded, spanning the full Bronze Age.
